Trichomoniasis

Trichomoniasis is caused by the single-celled protozoan parasite, *Trichomonas vaginalis*. Often referred to as "trich," this common sexually transmitted disease often has no symptoms.

The genital inflammation caused by trichomoniasis can increase a woman's susceptibility to HIV infection if she is exposed to the virus. Sex partners of patients with *T. vaginalis* should be treated. Vaginal trichomoniasis has been associated with adverse pregnancy outcomes, particularly premature rupture of membranes, preterm delivery, and low birth weight.

Trichomoniasis is not reportable in North Carolina.
